Talk about their family and people who are special to them.  Talk about what they enjoy, what they are good at and places they like to be  Talk about what makes them happy or sad.  Remember a Christian story and talk about it.	Retell the story of creation from Genesis 1:1-2.3 simply.  Recognise that 'Creation' is the beginning of the 'big story' of the Bible.  Say what the story tells Christians about God, Creation and the world.  Give at least one example of what Christians do to say thank you to God for the Creation.  Think, talk and ask questions about living in an amazing world.	Learn that we understand more about the world by using our senses and abilities to think and imagine.  Talk about what they find interesting or puzzling.  Learn more about the world and the way human beings have an influence on it.  Ask important questions about life and compare their ideas with those of other people.  Talk about some things in hymns that people believe.	Reflect on the physical and non-physical aspects of their identity.  Learn about one of the creation stories in the book of Genesis.  Reflect on the difficulty of keeping all the rules.  Begin to consider some of the factors that can influence behavior.  Consider how selfish behaviour can lead to suffering for others and for the selfish person and themselves.  Compare some of the things that influence them, with those that influence other people.	Place the concepts of God and Creation on a timeline of the Bible's 'Big Story'.  Make clear links between Genesis 1 and what Christians believe about God and Creation.  Describe what Christians do because they believe God is Creator. (For example, follow God, wonder at how amazing God's creation is; care for the earth in some specific ways.)  Ask questions and suggest answers about what might be important in the creation story for Christians living today, and for people who are not Christians.	Describe what a believer might learn from a story  Ask important questions about life and compare their ideas with those of other people.  Ask questions about the meaning and purpose of life, and suggest a range of answers which might be given by them as well as members of different religious groups or individuals.  Make links between the beliefs of different religious groups and show how they are connected to believers' lives;  Suggest reasons for the variety of beliefs which people hold, and explain how religious sources are used to provide answers to important questions.	Identify some different types of biblical texts, using technical terms accurately.  Explain connections between biblical texts and Christian ideas of God, using theological terms.  Make clear connections between Bible texts studied and what Christians believe about God; for example, through how churches are designed.  Show how Christians put their beliefs into practice in worship.  Weigh up how biblical ideas and teachings about God as holy and loving might make a difference in the world today, developing insights of their own.

Begin to know about their own cultures and beliefs and those of other people.  Have a developing awareness of their own needs, views and feelings and be sensitive to the needs, views and feelings of others.  Investigate objects and materials by using all of their senses as appropriate. Ask questions about why things happen and how things work.  Look closely at similarities, differences, patterns and change. (KUW)  Respond to significant experiences, showing a range of feelings when appropriate.	Talk about what they find interesting or puzzling.  Recognise religious art, symbols and words and talk about them  Say what some of the Christian words and symbols stand for.  Talk about some things in stories that make people ask questions.	Give a clear, simple account of the story of Jesus' birth and why Jesus is important for Christians.  Recognise that stories of Jesus' life come from the Gospels.  Give examples of ways in which Christians use the story of the nativity to guide their beliefs and actions at Christmas.  Decide what they personally have to be thankful for at Christmas time.	Identify the difference between a 'Gospel', which tells the story of the life and teaching of Jesus, and a letter.  Offer suggestions about what texts about baptism and Trinity might mean.  Give examples of what these texts mean to some Christians today.  Describe how Christians show their beliefs about God the Trinity in worship (in baptism and prayer, for example) and in the way they live.  Make links between some Bible texts studied and the idea of God in Christianity, expressing clearly some ideas of their own about what the God of Christianity is like.	Identify this as part of a 'Gospel', which tells the story of the life and teaching of Jesus.  Make clear links between the calling of the first disciples and how Christians today try to follow Jesus and be 'fishers of people'.  Offer suggestions about what Jesus' actions towards the leper might mean for a Christian.  Make simple links between Bible texts and the concept of 'Gospel' (good news).  Give examples of how Christians try to show love to all, including how members of the clergy follow Jesus' teaching.  Make links between the Bible stories studied and the importance of love, and life in the world today, expressing some ideas of their own clearly.	Describe and explain different ideas about God with reference to another religion  Provide good reasons for the views they have and the connections they make  Describe how Christians express beliefs about Jesus as 'Son of God' and 'Saviour' in worship and art  Describe and compare different ideas from the tradition being studied about the meanings of life and death with reference to key texts	Explain the place of Incarnation and Messiah within the 'big story' of the Bible. Identify Gospel and prophecy texts, using technical terms.  Explain connections between biblical texts, Incarnation and Messiah, using theological terms.  Show how Christians put their beliefs about Jesus' Incarnation into practice in different ways in celebrating Christmas.  Comment on how the idea that Jesus is the Messiah makes sense in the wider story of the Bible.  Weigh up how far the idea that Jesus is the Messiah — a Saviour from God — is important in the world today and, if it is true, what difference that might make in people's lives.

Offer suggestions for what the texts about the entry into Jerusalem, and the death and resurrection of Jesus might mean.  Give examples of what the texts studied mean to some Christians. Describe how Christians show their beliefs about Palm Sunday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday in worship.  Make links between some of the stories and teachings in the Bible and life in the world today, expressing some ideas of their own clearly.	Talk about what is important to themselves and others with respect for people's feelings.  Use religious words to describe some of the different ways in which people show their beliefs.  Ask questions about the moral decisions they and other people make, and suggest what might happen as a result of different decisions, including those made with reference to religious beliefs / values.  Describe different ways in which Christians use the Bible.  Describe how religious beliefs, ideas and feelings are expressed in a range of styles and suggest what they mean.  Ask questions about things that are important to them and to other people and suggest answers which relate to their own and others' lives.	Outline the timeline of the 'big story' of the Bible, explaining how Incarnation and Salvation fit within it.  Explain what Christians mean when they say that Jesus' death was a sacrifice, using theological terms.  Suggest meanings for narratives of Jesus' death/resurrection, comparing their ideas with ways in which Christians interpret these texts.  Make clear connections between the Christian belief in Jesus' death as a sacrifice and how Christians celebrate Holy Communion/Lord's Supper.  Show how Christians put their beliefs into practice.  Weigh up the value and impact of ideas of sacrifice in their own lives and the world today.	Outline the timeline of the 'big story' of the Bible.  Suggest meanings for resurrection accounts, and compare their ideas with ways in which Christians interpret these texts, showing awareness of the centrality of the Christian belief in Resurrection.  Explain connections between Luke 24 and the Christian concepts of Sacrifice, Resurrection, Salvation, Incarnation and Hope, using theological terms.  Make clear connections between Christian belief in the Resurrection and how Christians worship on Good Friday and Easter Sunday.  Show how Christians put their beliefs into practice in different ways. Explain why some people find belief in the Resurrection makes sense and inspires them.  Offer and justify their own responses as to what difference belief in Resurrection might make to how people respond to challenges and problems in the world today.

I know that the Old Testament tells the story of a particular group of people, the children of Israel — known as the People of God — and their relationship with God. Relate Christian teachings or beliefs about God's Kingdom to the issues, problems and opportunities of their own lives and the life of their own community in the world today, offering insights about whether or not the world could or should learn from Christian ideas.
