Nativity

The teachers and children in Little Acorns, Little Oaks, Year 1 and Year 2 are getting very excited about our Christmas Nativity this year.

We are aiming to be able to perform this in front of parents in the hall on the afternoon of Monday 13th December and the afternoon and evening of Tuesday 14th December.

By having three performances this year we are able to space out the audience, mitigate some of the risks and increase the likelihood of this event being able to go ahead. Currently we have very low COVID cases in the area and we are all hoping that this remains the case.

For each child in these classes, parents and carers are able to obtain 2 tickets (available from the school office; in person, by phone or email). Parents/carers should indicate which performance they wish to attend. Unlike previous years, due to the possibility that we may have to cancel should we have a COVID outbreak, we are not charging for tickets this year but would ask for our audience to make a donation for a programme on the day.

Remembrance Day and Poppies

Next week on 11th November we will hold a collect worship for staff and children in school to remember those affected by war.

We currently have poppies and various other items on sale in school should you wish to make a donation to the Royal British Legion.

Children should bring their money into class and any adults who wish to donate can do so via the school office.

Books, books, books

We are approximately in the middle of our journey to replenish stocks of books. We have already committed a lot of time and money to purchasing phonic resources and books for little Oaks, Year 1 and Year 2 who receive half an hour of phonic teaching a day, regular guided reading and 1:1 sessions each week.

Additionally, we have bought and resourced a Reading Scheme for children in Key Stage 2 who receive half an hour of Whole Class Reading each day focusing on reading fluency and comprehension.

One of our final drives is to purchase specific books that link to our Accelerated Reader scheme giving the children further choice of home readers at their specific level.

THANK YOU you to all the people who have donated books, money or time to increase the number of books available to children to read at home and in school.

At St Mary's we take anti-bullying very seriously. This topic is covered regularly in our PHSE scheme called JIGSAW, in collective worships, addressed by the school council and behaviour is monitored by all staff at all times.

In our last audit Kate Murphy from BANES, who spoke to children around the school noted the following bullet points:

What the School Council thinks the school does well (I asked this in terms of Anti-Bullying and Equalities ... the children wanted to tell me lots of things and I didn't want to censor them)

- Teachers and other staff are friendly, kind and approachable
- They make lessons exciting and interesting: they encourage us to do good work and give us rewards when we do well in our work or behaviour
 - •Teachers give a lot of time to children with special needs
 - •If there is an argument between children, staff give them time to sort it out
 - •If it can't be sorted out, teachers listen to both sides and help sort it out
 - •There is hardly any bullying but if there is teachers deal with it quickly
 - •The school keeps us safe and healthy and teaches us to be safe and healthy
 - We have activities outside and healthy eating lessons
 - •We have nice food at lunchtime
 - •We are given lots of time to do our work
- •We know that teachers need to give extra support to children who have problems with learning or behaviour
 - •We can have fun with teachers but we still do our work
 - Teachers play games with us in between lesson activities
 - •The school is clean and tidy and a nice place to be
- The headteacher is wonderful .. she makes assemblies really good .. she tells us stories and do funny voices and make things interesting
 - •We get Dojo points and house points to encourage us to do lots of positive things

When asked children are clear about what they should do if they feel they are being bullied and all can name a trusted adult who they would turn to.



Odd Socks Day is part of Anti-Bullying Week! To celebrate that we are all unique, we ask that children wear odd socks to that we are all unlque, we ask that children wear odd socks to school on Monday 15th November. Last year over 13,000 schools took part in Odd Socks Day, Andy Day (Cbeebles/Ebbc) and his band Andy and the Odd Socks are supporting the Anti-Bullying Alliance to help bring Odd Socks Day to life again this year.
