As we all know the more you read the better you'll get and certainly these children have shown commitment and determination in completing the challenge. And of course had a great time, immersed in new stories, as they have done so.



Building reading routines with your child

At the start of the year, it is timely to remind parents and carers of the importance of regular reading. The Book Trust sets out guidance on how to make this fun, suggests useful tips and advice about how to read as a family and advice on setting up a great bedtime routine.

Reading really is the cornerstone to learning; through books and reading children learn vocabulary that will enable them to access the curriculum. Continued practice ensures that children are able to read quickly and therefore read and understand more complicated texts.

Reading underpins much of the learning in school: we teach it in a variety of ways from guided reading to hearing individuals read, from phonics to reading comprehension.

Tips for reading with children of any age



- •Set aside some time Find somewhere quiet without any distractions turn off the TV/radio/computer.
- Ask your child to choose a book Sharing books they have chosen shows you care what they think and that their opinion matters. This means they are more likely to engage with the book.
 - Sit close together Encourage your child to hold the book themselves and/or turn the pages.
- •Point to the pictures If there are illustrations, relate them to something your child knows. Ask them to describe the characters or situation or what will happen next. Encourage them to tell you the story by looking at the pictures.
- •Encourage your child to talk about the book Talking about the characters and their dilemmas helps children understand relationships and is an excellent way for you to get to know each other or discuss difficult issues. Give your child plenty of time to respond. Ask them what will happen next, how a character might be feeling or how the book makes them feel.
- And lastly, above all make it fun! It doesn't matter how you read with a child, as long as you both enjoy the time together. Don't be afraid to use funny voices children love this!





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Classroom updating over the summer

Children in Class 3 will have noticed a new, updated classroom on their return to school. Due to the constraints on school budgets, that I am sure you have read about in the press, much of this transformation was completed through donations and the hard work of Mr Hodges – one of the site team at St Mary's.

We wish to bring the following to the attention of parents and carers. As a gentle reminder, attendance and absences are clearly documented below. Our aim would be for all children to be in school 100% of the time.
